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Course Competencies

At the completion of the course the student should be able to:

Comprehension

- I. Apply comprehension strategies to construct a text's meaning.
 1. Apply active reading strategies (i.e. SQ3R) to comprehend a written work's purpose and meaning and to develop a strategy for studying textbooks.
 2. Identify and analyze explicit textual information for improved comprehension.
 3. Analyze implicit textual information.
 4. Identify and analyze the purpose and tone of a text.

Vocabulary

- II. Apply a variety of vocabulary strategies to determine the meaning of unknown words.
 1. Comprehend new words and concepts through study of their relationships to other words and concepts.
 2. Apply knowledge of roots and affixes to infer the meanings of new words.
 3. Use reference guides (dictionaries, glossaries, thesauruses, etc.) to confirm the meanings of new words or concepts.

Fluency

- III. Increase reading rate and lexile level (reading level) to 1000 (lexile level) or 9th grade (reading level) through repeated practice readings.

Phonological Awareness

- IV. Apply phonological awareness strategies (word families, syllabication, phonetic rules) to decode unknown words.

Attendance Policy

Regular and punctual attendance is expected of all students in all College Prep classes for which they have registered. **There are NO excused absences.** After **3 hours** of absenteeism (missing class is 1 hour absent per class, 2 hours absent per week, not logging on weekly to ANGEL/MyReadingLab is 1 hour absent per week), a student may be warned and referred to the College Preparatory Studies Director. When a student has been absent from class or fails to log in to ANGEL/MyReadingLab for a total of **6 hours**, the student may be **dropped**. Being dropped from a College Prep course for non-attendance **may result** in being dropped from all remaining courses this semester. Inform the instructor in writing during the first week of class of any religious holidays observed this semester. Documentation must be given to the instructor at the class following the holiday.

Class Rules

3. Be courteous to your instructor and fellow classmates.
4. Maintain a positive and professional attitude.
5. Ask questions, get involved, and do your homework.

Late Work and Make up Policy

This course is designed to enable students to develop reading skills for college. Students who successfully develop reading skills do each assignment conscientiously and turn their work in on time. If you are absent, you are responsible for finding out what assignments you missed.

Graded homework assignments cannot be made up or turned in late for any reason.

Tests cannot be made up without prior arrangements or a doctor's note. Make-up tests must be taken within 5 days of the original test date.

No late work of any kind will be accepted the last week of classes (the week before finals).

THEA Compliance

If you did not pass the *THEA* test, or other approved test, in Reading, or Writing, or Mathematics, you will be required to complete a College Prep course **EVERY SEMESTER (including summers)** until you complete the course sequence or provide passing test scores.

Additional Recourses

Student Success Center:

The Student Success Center is designed to help all students at NCTC develop tools to achieve their academic goals. Students can attend free interactive workshops about Time Management, Study Skills, Test Anxiety, Choosing a Major, Learning Style Strategies, Career Exploration, and much more. This program also links students to FREE tutoring, including a Writing Center, a Math Lab, and free online. TRIO Program:

TRIO Programs are federally funded programs which offer services designed to assist students in achieving their academic goals. Services include educational workshops, academic advising, tutoring, personal counseling, career counseling, cultural enrichment, and financial aid information. Students may be eligible for TRIO if they are currently enrolled at North Central Texas College, have academic need, and meet at least ONE of THREE criteria which include: 1) first generation status—neither parent has graduated from college 2) income level is within federal low income guidelines, and/or 3) has a documented disability. TRIO is located in Room 170 on the Corinth Campus, Room 114 on the Gainesville Campus, and Room 124 on the Bowie Campus.
